Union Circuit Court

On the 9th day of July in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and twenty two being the second judicial day of the July Term of the Union Circuit Court personally appeared in open Court being a Court Record within and for the County of Union & State of Indiana William Doleau aged twenty nine years, resident in said County of Union who being duly sworn according to Law doth on his oath declare that he enlisted into the service on the 10th day of October in the year 1776 and was discharged on the 7th of December 1779 that he received his discharge from Col. Ruffel in Trenton New Jersey, that he enlisted first under Captain Morgan Alexander, that he served in the Revolutionary War in the company successively commanded by Captain, Marcus Colney then Thomas Kettle in the second Virginia Regiment, General Green's division, General Woodford's Brigade Colonel Lewis then Major Benjamin Gray.

And I William Doleau do solemnly swear that I was a retired citizen of the United States on the 18th day of May 1818 and that I have not since that time by gift sale or in any manner disposed of my property or any part thereof with intent thereby to diminish it as to bring within the provisions of an act of Congress entitled "an act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the revolutionary war" passed on the 18th day of March 1818 and that I have not, nor has any person in trust for me any property, security, contract or debt due to me nor have I any income other than what is contained in the schedule annexed and by me subscribed.

On this 16th day of October 1843 before the Probate Justice Court for the County aforesaid personally appeared Matthew Tatum a resident of said County, and being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain (for the children of Ruth Dollar) the benefits of the provision made by the act of Congress passed the 7 July 1838 entitled an act granting half pay and pensions to certain widows &c

That he is the son-in-law of William and Ruth Dollar deceased. that William Dollar aforesaid was a private soldier in the Revolutionary War as he has heard him state six years, nine months and twenty two days - for his services he was allowed a pension at the rate of eight dollars a month and was inscribed on the Pension List Roll of the State of Indiana from whence he removed some fifteen years ago to the State of Illinois and resided in this County of Hall until the day of his death which was on the 6th day of September 1838

This deponent further states that the said William was married (as he has reason to believe and does verily believe) to Ruth Bagley about the year 1780 in the State of Virginia the County he cannot state and that said William and Ruth Dollar lived together in the marriage relation from that time until the day of his death aforesaid and that the said Ruth remained a Widow

untill the 19th day of February 1842 at which time she
departed this life - The following are the children of the
said William and Ruth Dollar that were living at the time
of the death of said Ruth, and who are yet living as far as
known to this deponent. - (to wit,) Mary Logan, of the State
of Indiana wife of John Logan - Elisabeth Tharp, wife of
John Tharp of Arkansas - William Dollar of Georgia
James Dollar of the State of Indiana - Isaac Dollar
of the State of Missouri, and Lydia Tatum of Hamilton
County, Illinois who is the wife of this deponent. - he fur-
-ther states, that William and Ruth Dollar his Father
and Mother-in-law resided in the family with him from
about the year 1831 untill their deaths - that he has
of no record evidence of the marriage of said William
and Ruth, nor no other or older register of the ^{their children} births of
than the one here exhibited and hereto attached by
measuring, which was written by Joseph Dollar, the 2nd
child of said William & Ruth about twenty nine years ago
and is to the best of his knowledge and belief a correct
Register of ~~the children~~ of said William and Ruth's chil-
-dren. The said Joseph Dollar departed this life before
the death of his Mother, Ruth **Matthew Tatum**
sworn and subscribed the foregoing and given above writing.

 is Dead Aunt Abse Young is going to Decay she has lost

Be it known that on the 17th day of October 1843 before the Subscriber a Justice of the peace in and for the County of said personally appeared Stephen Lindsey aged 68 years (nearly), who I certify to be a credible witness and being duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following statement. That in his youth & first days he resided in Bartley County Virginia. where he had an aunt, his Mother's sister, whose maiden name was Ruth Beegley - her husband's name was William Dollar. he cannot as to his own knowledge say anything as to their marriage - yet he has reason to believe and does verily believe they were lawfully joined in marriage as early as 1780 - he knows that they lived together in the marriage relation from his earliest recollection when this deponent was about seven or eight years of age. That, about the year 1782 or 3 he resided for some time with said William & Ruth and from that time until about 1789 or 90 he resided near them and occasionally with them - about that time said William & Ruth removed to Carolina - he afterwards saw them and knew them when they lived in the State of Indiana and since that time he has seen them in this County of Fulton where they resided some 25 miles

from the residence of this deponent. and where from
information they both departed this life some few years
since and further this deponent saith not
sworn to and subscribed the day and year first above

Dear Madam:

I advise you from the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim, W. 22965, it appears that William Dollor (name also appears as Dollar and Doller) of Frederick County, Virginia, enlisted October 15, 1776, served as private in Captains Morgan Alexander's, Marquis Calmes' and Thomas Collet's Companies, Colonel Christian Febiger's Virginia Regiment and was discharged December 7, 1779.

He was allowed pension on his application executed July 9, 1822, while a resident of Union County, Indiana. He died September 6, 1838 in Fulton County, Illinois.

Soldier married in 1780 in Frederick County or in Berkeley County, Virginia, Ruth Beesley of Berkeley County, Virginia, and later they moved to one of the Carolinas.

They had the following children:

Joseph	" September 6, 1785
Elizabeth	" September 5, 1788, married John Thorp

James	" September 29, 1792
Jesse	" October 6, 1797

Soldier's widow, Ruth, died February 19, 1842 in Fulton County, Illinois.

The following surviving children received the pension due their mother at the time of her death, namely: Mary Logan of Indiana, Elizabeth Thorp of Arkansas, William Dollar of Georgia, James Dollar of Indiana, Jesse Dollar of Missouri and Lydia Tatum of Fulton County, Illinois.
