Mc Nutt had disappeared.

Joshua John	1816	Brownstown	Jackson	IN	Borrowed money	Promissory note to John Milroy, agent for Brownstown signed by Joshua and John Lindsey 12-18-1816	They promised to pay back the amount in 9 months and 22 days (Sept. 30, 1817).

Joshua	1823 - 1824	Brownstown	Jackson	IN	Lawsuit	Jackson Co. Probate Book – found in the basement of the courthouse in Brownstown. Carol Huber recorded notes in 2001. Pages 257, 271, 272, 311.	Levin/Leaven Cooper sued Charles Crabb, administrator of Joshua's estate. The case was in the chancery. It was continued from the June 1823 term to the March 1824 term when it was ordered to be certified to the Supreme Court.
